A note from Dan **Ringler** telling me he is heading up the 3rd Military Airlift Squadron reunion 19-22 October in Fairfield, California (near Travis AFB). Along with a number of classmates Dan and I were both in the then 3rd ATS while at Charleston between 1964 and 1965. Charleston was our first assignment out of flight school and that triggers a lot of memories.

The story goes: a number of us newly minted pilots arrived at Charleston AFB back in October 1964. Classmates I remember included Barney Bartlett, Gordon Bredvick, Dick Ferency, Denny Haycraft, Dan Ringler plus a West Point '63 grad, Bill Sipos. We were right out of pilot training and destined to become airlift pilots for MATS. Without any aircraft training enroute or anything else such as survival at Stead, we reported for duty with either the 3rd ATS or the 17th ATS. The powers to be didn't know what to do with us but over time we went through ground and simulator training in Old Shaky and an occasional flight in the pattern with an Instructor and on the line as 3rd Pilots. Then, in the spring of 1965 rumors were confirmed: we were given orders to travel to Tinker AFB, OK for training in the brand new C-141! We were in the first Charleston class (P-13) along with a group of other neophytes and an equal number of old-head C-124 Instructor Pilots and Flight Engineers. We returned to Charleston from Tinker in August of 1965 and precisely one year later most of us new co-pilots left for SEA assignments-I was to be a FAC in the O-1. Dan's experience was very similar but was off to SEA after a year's training learning to fly helicopters and then the HH-53B prior to heading to Udorn RTAFB. Dan added that Carl Oliver was his flight instructor for the H-19 at Sheppard AFB, TX when he started helicopter flight training. "Ollie"

also ended up in Udorn with Dan flying the HH-53Bs. Dan said Carl was a great helicopter pilot, and it's really sad that he lost his life (through no fault of his own) while flying an HH-53B training mission over the Gulf of Mexico when he was at Eglin AFB and after he returned from SEA. Must be many stories like this. If you have one send it along with photos.

On 6 May 2006, C-141 SN 66-0177 the last operational C-141 (the famous *Hanoi Taxi*) landed for the last time and was received in a formal retirement ceremony at the National Museum of the United States Air Force, located at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base. There are, I am told, only 15 of the airplanes on display throughout the country.
