Came for a week, but stayed six years. The first winter we lived in an old log cabin on the lake. Fireplace heat, claw foot bathtub, and a wood-burning cooking stove and oven in the kitchen. Our next door neighbor was Norman McLean, author of “A River Runs Through It.” Our baby sitter’s husband was a trapper. He spent several months a year in the Bob Marshall Wilderness gathering pelts. Built a home. But finally got lured out of the mountains for Colorado Springs. Good times and the wildlife was incredible: eagles, ospreys, elk, bears, lions, and moose.” Wow! What an experience.

These days John is on the book signing circuit for his book *Taps On The Wall* where he was seen at the National War College and the San Francisco Yacht Club. 

Major Thomas B. **Mitchell** was reported missing on 22 May 1968 while on an operational mission in Laos. The C-130 Blind Bat aircraft he was co-piloting did not return to friendly control and he was declared MIA at the time of estimated fuel exhaustion. His status was changed to KIA on 27 February 1975. Tom was assigned to a detachment of the 41st TAS at Ubon AB, Thailand. He was promoted to Major posthumously.

Captain John H. **Hathaway** was killed on 11 October 1969 while on a combat gunship mission in South Vietnam. Immediately after takeoff, the AC-119 aircraft he was co-piloting caught fire.

The aircraft went into a sharp left turn and crashed 500 yards to the left of the west runway and burst into flames. John was assigned to the 17th SOS at Tan Son Nhut, RVN.

Captain Wayne E. **Newberry** was reported missing on 29 September 1968 while on an operational mission in Southeast Asia. The A-1H he was piloting was observed to crash after being struck by hostile fire. His status was changed to Killed in Action on 23 September 1969. Wayne was assigned to the 6th SOS based at Pleiku, AB RVN

Farewell to Bob **Mazet**

On a sunny, late-April morning, the USAFA Class of 1963 gathered at the Academy Cemetery for the third time in two months to bid a final farewell to a classmate. Bob Mazet was laid to rest after a long period of hospitalization and long-term care.

Bob had no surviving next-of-kin. The lady from the funeral home said they'd been told to expect very few people at the memorial service. However, I told her that Bob was a member of the Class of 1963, and we show up. Also a few of Bob's friends had flown up from Arizona representing what seems to have been an extended family of friends of Bob among many people he had helped over the years. Bill Wecker mentioned he'd had a call yesterday from a woman in California for whom Bob had performed some medical miracle. So Bob's good works spread far beyond his days at the Academy and his years in the Air Force. Ed Reisdorf accepted the folded flag on Bob's behalf.

Bob had flown approximately 350 combat missions in F-4s in Southeast Asia. One of the final acts of the morning was the placing of a few nickels on Bob's casket.

Among those who gathered were Ed Reisdorf up from Arizona, Bill and Mary Linn Wecker (and local daughter and son-in-law) from California, Butch Verdier from California, along with Bob Hayes, Jack Ott, Jim Olsson, Gordon Bredvik, Denny King, Jim Hauser, Phil Tate, Ev Vaughn, Drue Deberry, Dave & Carol Nuss, Stinky & Karen Steinbrink, Jimmie Butler, and Vic Andrews, class of 66 who was one of Bob's doolies he trained so many years ago. I apologize if I missed any classmate or spouse.

On a crisp, sunny March 1st morning, we said a final farewell to our classmate Colonel (Doctor) Ray Hamilton. Ray had passed away unexpectedly at Auburn, Alabama, where he was a noted professor. Ray's son, Rex, and daughter, Chrissy, along with other family members and friends from Alabama were in attendance. Ray's wife, Melissa, had preceded him by a couple of years after a long battle with Alzheimer's, and they now are buried together at the Academy Cemetery. Nearly a dozen classmates and several wives were in attendance. Jim Kuhn had been Ray's roommate at graduation, and Jim's wife, Ann, joined us. Jim is finishing up at their previous location and will be joining the local group of classmates in a couple of days as the Kuhn's settle here.

Afterward, many in attendance gathered at the clubhouse of the Eisenhower Golf Course and shared memories about Ray. Most were funny; some were poignant. It was a reminder, once again—as we are always reminded at our mini-reunion cup-turning ceremonies—of what an extraordinary group of young men joined together at the Academy on 26 June 1959.

The full military honors were done superbly, as ever, by the Academy Honor Guard, chaplain, and the colonel who presented the flag. It was a fitting service for a great man and a great classmate.
