OK it is time for some reflection: JFK's 1963 graduation speech was featured on several occasions lately. In September the C-Springs Gazette Telegraph article about JFK and our Graduation in 1963 was included; thanks to Gary Bender we were alerted to a TV commercial (mostly associated with Falcon Football) with the JFK's graduation speech as the audio background for the commercial scenes; and now, Dick Slowik referred us to the December Air Force magazine's "Keeper File" with an abridged version of the speech and a picture showing JFK and some of our classmates. All of this is, in my mind, a worthwhile memory reminding us of this important moment in our lives. It is clear to me that the more I hear the speech and read the entire transcript there is much to appreciate and learn. The AF Magazine's abridged version left out among others a very prophetic next to last paragraph which depicts a clear-cut view of the future by JFK and his top advisors Something I think subsequent administrations over and over again failed to recognize. For that reason, I think it important to reproduce that short paragraph where we are told: "We live in a world, in short, where the principal problems that we face are not susceptible to military solutions alone. The role of our military power, in essence, is, therefore, to free ourselves and our allies to pursue the goals of freedom without the danger of enemy attack, but we do not have a separate military policy, and a separate diplomatic policy, and a separate disarmament policy, and a separate foreign aid policy, all unrelated to each other. They are all bound up together in the policy of the United States. Our goal is a coherent, overall, national security policy, one that truly serves the best interests of this country and those who depend upon it. It is worth noting that all of the decisions which we now face today will come in increased numbers in the months and years ahead." I am truly saddened that JFK's time with us was cut so short and maybe fatally so.
